Elaborating Summer Practice</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Contract is signed up by the three program's partners (Student-Carrier- Research Office) • Selection of supervisor according to the subject of Summer Practice • Acquiring security service number and opening a banking account for the deposit of the payment • Entering into carrier's working structure • Filling in the program evaluation questionnaire • Carrier signs up student's attendance verification for the job period <p>3. Report submission and Completion Processes</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Student submits a detailed report relating to the kind of work executed by him/her over the time of his/her Summer Practice on the Carrier.
